WHAT IS FRAUD?

Today we hear the word "fraud" tossed about. Everything that is called fraud does not always fit the legal definition of fraud. Fraud is only one of the ways an employee may benefit improperly.

Essentially, fraud is the use of deceit to achieve a goal. The offense of fraud has several distinct elements, all of which must be present. They are:

- a.) A person makes a material misrepresentation to another,
- b.) The representation is false and the person making it either knows it is false or makes the representation with reckless disregard of the truth
- c.) The person making the representation intends for the other person to rely upon it
- d.) The other person does rely upon it
- e.) The person relying upon the representation is injured because of the reliance

Occupational fraud is an accounting term of art; it is not *per se* legal fraud. In many cases, the term is better stated "occupational fraud and abuse." The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) defines it as, "The use of one's occupation for personal enrichment through the deliberate misuse or misapplication of the employing organization's resources or assets." Although the term occupational fraud is useful in discussing employee misdeeds, it includes many offenses that are not fraud in the strict legal sense. Examples of occupational fraud that do not constitute fraud in the true legal sense include; theft, bribery, waste and abuse of position or authority.

The Association of Certified Fraud Examiners (ACFE) classifies Occupational Fraud and Abuse under three main categories. They are:

- a.) Asset Misappropriation
- b.) Fraudulent Statements
- c.) Corruption

Asset Misappropriation by far is the most common of the three schemes which includes fraudulent disbursements, cash larceny, cash skimming, misuse of assets and larceny of assets.

HOW EMERGING TECHNOLOGY WILL CHANGE OUR WORK- PLACE

Chapter 3 -Space the Final Frontier (or What is an Office Good for Anyway?)

An issue for many businesses today is the mix between their "Brick and Mortar" and Click and Mortar" operations.¹ This differential between physical presence in a location and being "virtually there" (via our continuous connections) will have a host of impacts beyond just the relationship between a customer and a service provider.² in this installment we will try to examine how the movement toward one computing device, and toward ubiquitous communication/connections will interact with where we work and what our workplaces may look like.

The evolution of the modern office is shrouded in the ancient history of man. Although a few of my acquaintances claim it was invented as an excuse for a coffee break,³ organization theory contends it was to organize & control common activities.⁴ As we move toward one basic computing device and continuous connections anywhere-anytime, new views on what an office will look like are emerging.

Telework^{5a&b} is emerging as the office arrangement of choice for several modes of customer contact. This supports several ways of doing business. For businesses with very close personal contact, the availability of continuous connections will put some of us in our business partner's workspace. This will work well for investigative fields (auditors, inspectors, & some sales people). For many with administrative work they will be able to use video & telephone connections to work from home^{5c} or regional centers^{5d}.

A fixed office may still be appropriate for some functions. Where that occurs it will hardly look the same as what we use today. For many workers, having a desk or an office may become entirely optional. Many current groups will be replaced by virtual teams^{5e} with some members traveling, some working from home, and some working from the central "office". Typing will be supplanted in favor of voice recognition (dictation) and handwriting recognition - so you won't need a traditional desk. Individual cubicles assigned to one person are likely to be rare because many individuals will be teleworking much of the time. As a result, more office spaces will be open to shared uses for collaborative projects^{6a} and will tend to have large projection areas for intermittent use by individuals or for collaborative teams to work.^{6b}The

DEFENSE WEIGHS STRATEGY FOR RELEASING BASE CLOSURE LIST

The Defense Department may not give Congress much advance notice about what military bases it wants to realign and close.

According to a Defense official, who spoke on the condition of anonymity, lawmakers likely will receive base realignment and closure recommendations about an hour before Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld holds a press conference to announce them in early May. Those recommendations are expected to be hand-delivered to congressional offices, the official said.

The recommendations will be published on the Defense Department's Web site immediately following Rumsfeld's remarks. A separate Web site will be created to provide personnel information for federal employees whose bases are closing or whose jobs are being relocated.

Commanders of military installations could be given as much as 12 hours advance notice if their base is on the list.

Military communities across the nation are eagerly awaiting the announcement to find out if their bases will be closed or realigned. The Pentagon initially suggested that about a quarter of space on all military bases was unneeded, but Rumsfeld recently downplayed those comments, saying some of the space would be needed to accommodate troops relocating back to the United States from Europe.

Once the Pentagon recommendations are released, the independent Base Realignment and Closure commission, chaired by former Veteran Affairs Secretary Anthony Principi, will review them at public hearings, conduct its own analysis and make final recommendations to the president by Sept 8. If the president backs those recommendations, then Congress has 45 legislative days to reject or approve them in their entirety.

The Pentagon has formed a communications task force, headed by Dick McGraw, special assistant to the secretary of Defense, that is addressing concerns about the date on which the report will be released, who will be notified in advance, and how the actual list will be announced to military communities around the country. The Pentagon even hired a consulting firm, BearingPoint Inc., to assist in crafting its

EIGHT STATES DESIGNATE MARCH 'CGFM MONTH'

Thanks to the initiative and dedication of AGA regional and chapter leaders, eight states have declared March as Certified Government Financial Manager month. Governors signed proclamations in Arkansas, Idaho, Louisiana, Maine, Michigan, Tennessee, Texas and Wisconsin. In addition, Indiana declared March as "Indiana Government Accountants Month".

David Mellem, CGFM, an AGA regional CGFM coordinator for North Central region, started the initiative last year when he received support from Governor James Doyle and Secretary of State Douglas La Follette, who declared April of 2004 as CGFM Month in Wisconsin.

"When I called the governor's office there was no hesitation," Mellem recalled. "They responded the following day."

Mellem wrote the proclamation, which briefly describes AGA, the Southern Wisconsin chapter, its commitment to government accountability,

and the rigorous testing and education requirements to earn and maintain the CGFM designation. The proclamation, which was again approved this year, reads in part that the CGFM "provides a means of demonstrating professionalism and competency" and that chapter members are "making significant advances both in professional ability and in service to the citizens of Wisconsin by mastering increasingly technical and complex requirements . . . "

Mellem said other chapter leaders and regional coordinators discussed the idea of seeking similar proclamations from governors around the country during a monthly teleconference meeting. Other AGA chapters used Mellem's proclamation as a model, and seven additional governors proclaimed March of 2005 as CGFM month.

Mellem said chapters can build on their success. "There's more we can do. I would think it would help because there's some degree of backing from the governor in promoting the program," he said. The next step for the Southern Wisconsin Chapter is to meet with one of the state employees unions to raise the idea of gaining recognition for the CGFM in hiring and promotions in state government.

net result of this will be a combination of “caves and commons”^{6c} with cubbies (not cubicles) for individuals and common areas for teams.

Since all of these trends will increase accessibility, expect to see more folks that are now excluded from collaboration^{6d} become part of your processes. Physically infirm and handicapped individuals will now be participating both in the central site and remotely.

In our future, fixed offices will serve as repositories for things which are not readily portable. In the past this meant a place to access corporate information and supplies. Generally, this means the office will become a logistics and social hub to bind our more diverse and decentralized workforce together. In our next installment, we will examine how our organizations and habits will need to transform to accommodate these changes in our work environment.

BRAC communications plan.

Federal law requires that the Defense Department publish a list of which bases it wants closed in the *Federal Register* no later than Monday, March 16, but that date will likely move up amid concerns that the information would leak out over the weekend before being published.

The Pentagon could release the list on the preceding Friday, but officials worry about headlines that might be created by releasing it on Friday the 13th. Options are being weighed to make the announcement as early as Tuesday, May 10, according to Defense officials and BRAC lobbyists.

Meanwhile, the independent Overseas Basing Commission will announce on May 10 its recommendations for how U.S. forces should be based overseas. The commission was appointed by Congress to assess whether overseas bases should be closed, realigned or established in new areas.

Al Corenella, a South Dakota businessman who heads the commission and served as a BRAC commission member in 1995, says the report originally was expected in August, but the release date was moved up so that it could be considered in domestic base closure deliberations. Unlike the BRAC commissions, the overseas panel's recommendations are advisory only.

EVENT RECAP AGA APRIL LUNCHEON

The April Luncheon began with the annual award ceremony to honor those who have helped build the AGA Greater Columbus Chapter and have contributed towards making it a great success. Chapter President Nancy Zmyslinski, CGFM presented awards to the following persons:

It was with great pleasure to hear from guest speaker Eric Engelbrektsson, DLA Deputy Comptroller and retiree from the U.S. Army. Mr. Engelbrektsson shared his story of life in Iraq as the Deputy Chief Finance Officer. He presented the Greater Columbus Chapter with a detailed description of the Coalition Provision Authority (CPA) funds, the DLA working capital funds, the Developmental Fund for Iraq (DFI), FY03 financial statements, security updates, and pictures to demonstrate the reality of day-to-day Iraqi conditions.

Mr. Engelbrektsson discussed his temporary assignment as a CPA staff member and his role in the FY03 audit process and building the budget for FY04. The following includes a brief description of the funds he worked with, as mentioned above:

- CPA funds - Used for OMA, Iraq relief and construction funds. Includes seized and vested funds, as well as DFI funds.
 - Seized funds - Cash found in Iraq; former Iraqi regime funds
 - Vested funds - Iraq assets found in outside/surrounding countries
 - DFI funds - Funds received from oil for food program (95% of export sales and 5% of Kuwait war preparations)

With regards to DFI funds, for the majority of the time these funds were held in the Central Bank of Iraq. The document for which notes the establishment and rules for DFI is referred to as the Resolution 1483 (modified in 2003).

Mr. Engelbrektsson also spoke on some of the security issues were prevalent during his stay in Iraq. As a requirement, the CJTF-7 personnel wore weapons at all times. As for CPA members, carrying weapons were optional. Operational threat updates were provided daily.

Another topic worthy of mentioning was the Commanders Emergency Response Program. This gave money to the Commanders out in the field for the purpose of getting cash into the hands where needed. Guidelines were established for allowable spending.

Mike Serowik is a Quality Specialist in the Quality Management Division (QMD) of the Defense Finance and Accounting Services organization in Indianapolis, Indiana. As a team member of the QMD he is helping develop the lean production and "six sigma" program which includes developing program processes, Sponsor/Champion, Black Belt and Green Belt training, and project consultation. As a federal employee for more than 16 years Mike has provided statistical and process improvement support to DFAS and the Naval Air Warfare Center.

Mike served as the Baldrige assessment project manager for the pilot study at Pensacola, Florida. Outside of his regular duties Mike has also served as a Malcolm Baldrige examiner, and lead examiner for the Office of Personnel Management's "Presidents Quality Award". Mike has also served as the executive chairman for the Indianapolis section of the American Society of Quality and was one of the original directors of the National Center for Creativity in Indianapolis.

Professional Certifications

What do I need one for?

"Certification programs are win-win-win--the certifiers benefit; the certified benefit; and so does any customer, client or employer who relies on the certification. That should explain why, within a decade, every market leader in every global industry will offer certification programs for its key employees" (Fortune Magazine, 6/26/00)

If one were to look around and do some research one could surmise that there is a near cornucopia of professional certifications available to be earned. The key is not to get a underwater basket weaver's certification, unless of course you are an underwater basket weaver, but to get a certification in the field in which you work or hope to work.

In the Government Accountability Profession there are quite a few designations that will be of benefit to you in the advancement of your career. For the sake of space we will discuss the CPA and CGFM.

One option is to pursue the Certified Public Accountant designation. The CPA has become the preferred designation in the Government and is recognized globally.

There are a few hindrances to the pursuing of the CPA. First, an individual now must have 150 hours of college classes. Additionally, the AICPA recently announced its intention to continue raising the bar by encouraging tougher standards for those 150 hours and that states come to a common minimum standard for experience.

If you are not aware, most states currently require only 24 hours of accounting in the 150. The new recommendation will be that requirements be enacted for classes in Finance, Economics, etc. Most of these classes will be covered by those receiving a Graduate Degree, however those who have in times past met the requirement with their Undergraduate degree will find a more difficult time in doing so.

Additionally, the number of years of work experience across the varied states is vastly different. For example, North Dakota requires two years of experience, while Ohio requires only one. If one were to work in the Taxation or Audit practice of a public accounting firm you would find even larger differences between the states for experience.

A second option is to pursue the Certified Government Financial Manager. The CGFM's requirements are less rigorous than those for the CPA. However, this is not a certification to be pursued flippantly. Granted there was an individual who recently earned his CGFM in just a matter of weeks. However, he put his whole life on hold while pursuing the certification, going so far as to live out of a hotel in his hometown so he could have time to study.

The CGFM is a great certification for those who plan to work in the field of government accountability. This designation is more focussed than the CPA in that it is only concerned with Government, not with the broad spectrum of knowledge required for the CPA. Those with the CGFM work for federal, state, and local governments across the world as well as for public companies.

So, why would you want to pursue a certification? There are quite a few reasons. First, in a 2001 survey by Robert Half International, a financial management placement firm, 85% of the 1400 CFOs surveyed "believed that a professional certification...can boost career advancement opportunities." Second, a professional designation acts as a notification to individuals that do not know you that you have attained and maintain a certain amount of knowledge about a given subject. Third, the earning of a designation can bring a great deal of satisfaction when finally achieved.

So, if you want to get ahead in your career, prove to people you know a subject, and attain some personal satisfaction pursue a professional designation.
